

Townhalls


We have been having townhalls with our learners every Wednesday. For the uninitiated, townhalls are a platform where students raise issues affecting the entire school and try coming up with solutions for the same. The first one was moderated by our founder Ms. Preethi Vickram and it was an extremely engaging session. Thereafter. learners have been holding these sessions with a moderator (the one who raises an issue and facilitates the session) and a recorder (the one who records the minutes of the meeting). 


Townhalls

It was a very exciting journey to say the least; not only from a project output perspective but also from a project planning perspective.

Announcement


Dussehra Break: The mid term break is from the 26th September to the 5th of October. School reopens on the 6th of October, Thursday. We hope to see all our learners on that day.
